#### Autumn and God in everything.

Recently, I have been reading Fr Richard McCullen's inspiring book called 'Deep Down Things' from talks which he gave to the Daughters and Priests of the Mission. A chapter heading interested me, 'Hidden with Christ in God', and on reading it, found it was about St Catherine Laboure, the Daughter of Charity who was privileged to receive several beautiful apparitions of Our Blessed Lady.

As this month of November celebrates the feast of the 'Miraculous Medal' and of St Catherine Laboure , I would like to share a few thoughts from Fr Richard's book.

Catherine lived her life "hidden with Christ in God." (Colossians 3:3) At the end of the book by Fr Laurentin on St Catherine, he sums up her sanctity in this phrase: "God in everything," and also "everything in God" and "everything for God." This programme of sanctity was not devised by Catherine, but came from the virtue of Simplicity advocated by St Vincent – "acting with God alone in view".

Catherine was not canonised solely because she was blessed with seeing of Our Lady with her eyes, but because she saw God with her spiritual eyes. After Catherine died, one of her companions said, "Her pure and limpid gaze looked only to God."

As we come to the feasts, we would do well to remember, that Catherine was a saint of 'silence'. Our Lady had told her "You will have much to suffer, but come to the foot of the altar. There you will receive all the graces you need." "You will have much to suffer..." She had, as there were many misunderstandings in her life where she had to 'bite her lips' and be silent. No doubt too, she had to bite her lips in order to keep her secret of forty-four years, that she was the instrument Our Lady had used to have the Medal struck.

On the day before she died, her Sisters asked her to tell them anything about the Blessed Virgin. Catherine replied: "The rosary must be said better...The Immaculate Conception must be honoured and that purity, of which it is the most beautiful symbol, must be dear to our children... Did she (Our Lady) not promise: I shall grant special graces every time that people pray in the Chapel of the rue du Bac, especially for an increase of purity, that purity of the spirit, of the heart and the will which is pure love?" May St Catherine obtain for us all that purity of heart, of mind and of body, which is pure love.
